<p><b>Suggested examples of how these elements of Podiatric Clinical Management could be covered:</b></p>	
<p><b>Patient case study</b></p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Sit in at a presentation of a case (and hopefully engage in discussion with the presenter)</li> <li>• Present a case study to colleagues at a:             <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• PNZ branch meeting (or to a small group of local colleagues if unable to get to a local branch)</li> <li>• Conference</li> <li>• Inter-professional meeting</li> </ul> </li> <li>• Both of the above (listening to and discussing with a colleague presenting at a meeting, and delivering a presentation themselves)</li> </ul>
<p><b>Look at a specific aspect of clinical management in some detail</b></p>	<p>Seminar/ presentation / workshop on:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• biomechanical diagnosis</li> <li>• differential diagnosis of manifestations of say connective tissue disease or endocrine disease in the foot or lower limb</li> <li>• Any aspect of “ADTAR” acronym above (ie: Assessment, Diagnosis, Treatment, Advice, Referral)</li> </ul>
<p><b>Any multi / inter-professional clinical management educational activities involving podiatric input</b></p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Clinical management of the diabetic foot</li> <li>• Clinical management of the “at risk foot” generally (Rh, ischaemic, etc)</li> <li>• Wound management involving the lower limb (not just the foot)</li> </ul>
